In about 30 minutes on a rainy day in 1832, Samuel F. Smith wrote these classic lyrics. The first three verses encourage and invoke national pride, while the last verse is a petition to God for His continued favor and protection of the United States of America



The Army Goes Rolling Along (US Army)

<u>INTRO:</u> March along, sing our song, with the Army of the free Count the brave, count the true, who have fought to victory We're the Army and proud of our name We're the Army and proudly proclaim

<u>VERSE:</u> First to fight for the right, And to build the Nation's might, And The Army Goes Rolling Along Proud of all we have done, Fighting till the battle's won, And the Army Goes Rolling Along.

"The Army Goes Rolling Along" was designated the official song of the United States Army in 1956. Yet its history goes back to March 1908 when Brigadier General Edmund Louis "Snitz" Gruber wrote "The Caissons Go Rolling Along."

It was the US Naval Academy's Football team who originally inspired the battle cry song known as Anchor's Aweigh. The term itself means that the Anchor has been pulled from the bottom and the vessel is launched and features predominately in the song.

The "**Marines' Hymn**" is the official hymn of the United States Marine Corps, introduced by the first Director of USMC Band, Francesco Maria Scala. It is the oldest official song in the United States Armed Forces.



The U.S. Air Force Song (USAF)

Originally, the song was titled "Army Air Corps". Robert MacArthur Crawford wrote the lyrics and music during 1938.^[1] During World War II, the service was renamed "Army Air Force", and the song title changed to agree. In 1947, when the Air Force became a separate service, the song became the "Air Force Song".



Semper Paratus (USCG)

First Verse:

From Aztec Shore to Arctic Zone, To Europe and Far East, The Flag is carried by our ships In times of war and peace; And never have we struck it yet In spite of foemen's might, Who cheered our crews and cheered again For showing how to fight.

Chorus:

The United States Coast Guard is the world's oldest life-saving service and "Semper Paratus" ("Always Ready") is its theme song. The song's original words and music were composed by Captain Francis Saltus Van Boskerck, USCG in 1927.

The Stars and Stripes Forever" is a patriotic American march widely considered to be the magnum opus of composer John Philip Sousa. He composed his famous march on Christmas Day, 1896 while at sea, returning from a trip to Europe. Sousa said the song was about the feeling of coming home to America and how "in a foreign country the sight of the Stars and Stripes seems the most glorious in the world."

Taps" is a <u>bugle call</u> played at dusk, during flag ceremonies, and at <u>military funerals</u> by the <u>United States armed forces</u>. The official military version is played by a single bugle or <u>trumpet</u>

"Yankee Doodle" is a well-known early American song, the early versions of which date back to the American Revolution (1775–83). It is often sung patriotically in the United States today and is the state anthem of Connecticut.

"God Bless the USA" is an American patriotic song written and recorded by country music artist Lee Greenwood. The song gained popularity after the September 11, 2001 attacks, during the 2003 invasion of Iraq, and in May, 2011 when Osama bin Laden (responsible for the 2001 bombings) was killed in an American raid in Pakistan.
